Dear Chairperson Foland:

The Nebraska Auditor of Public Accounts (APA) has reviewed the audit waiver request received from the Belgrade Fire District 4 (District) for the fiscal year ending 2021. **That request has been approved.**

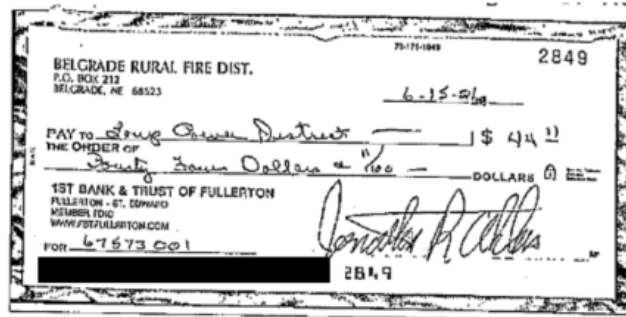
While performing, pursuant to Neb. Rev. Stat. § 84-304 (2021 Neb. Laws, LB 528, § 51), the preliminary examination necessary to determine whether further audit work would be required or the audit waiver should be allowed, the APA noted certain internal control or compliance matters, or other operational issues, within the District.

The following information is intended to improve internal controls or result in other operational efficiencies.

## Comments and Recommendations

### 1. Lack of Dual Signatures

The APA obtained the monthly statements for the District's bank accounts from its fiscal year 2021 audit waiver request. From those statements, the APA noted that all District checks written during the examination period contained only one signature. An example of such checks is shown below.



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Nebraska law requires both the Secretary-Treasurer and the President of the District to sign all checks approved by the Board. In particular, Neb. Rev. Stat. § 35-511 (Reissue 2016) states that those checks "shall bear the signature of the secretary-treasurer and the countersignature of the president of such district."

In addition, good internal controls and sound accounting practices require procedures to ensure that District checks contain the statutorily required endorsements.

Without such procedures, there is an increased risk for not only failure to comply with State statute but also loss or misuse of public funds.

A similar issue was identified by the APA in a prior review and was disclosed to the District in the APA's letter dated January 5, 2021, which can be found on the APA's website. However, it does not appear this issue was corrected after the APA's notification.

We recommend the Board implement procedures to require dual signatures, from both the Secretary-Treasurer and the President, on all District checks, as required by law.

**2. Negative Bank Balance**

While examining the District's bank statements, the APA noted that the District's checking account had a negative balance from August 12, 2020, to August 17, 2020. During that period, the largest negative balance was \$287.66. For the fiscal year ended June 30, 2021, the Township incurred \$30 in overdraft fees.

Good internal control and sound business practices require procedures to ensure that funds are available in the Township's bank account prior to payment. Without such procedures, additional fees can occur.

We recommend the Board implement procedures to ensure funds are available in the bank account prior to payment.

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The preliminary planning work that resulted in this letter was designed primarily on a test basis and, therefore, may not bring to light all existing weaknesses in the District's policies or procedures. Nevertheless, our objective is to use the knowledge gained during the performance of that preliminary planning work to make comments and suggestions that we hope will prove useful to the District.
